Currently, the increasingly diverse student population across Washington state looks extremely different from the educator and education leader populations. The Network for EdWork develops collaborative partnerships with and among districts, schools, nonprofits, and government to close gaps in recruitment, attrition, and promotion of BIPOC educators and education leaders to become more representative of their student populations. Supporting and connecting BIPOC educators and leaders is essential to creating education spaces where students of color thrive.

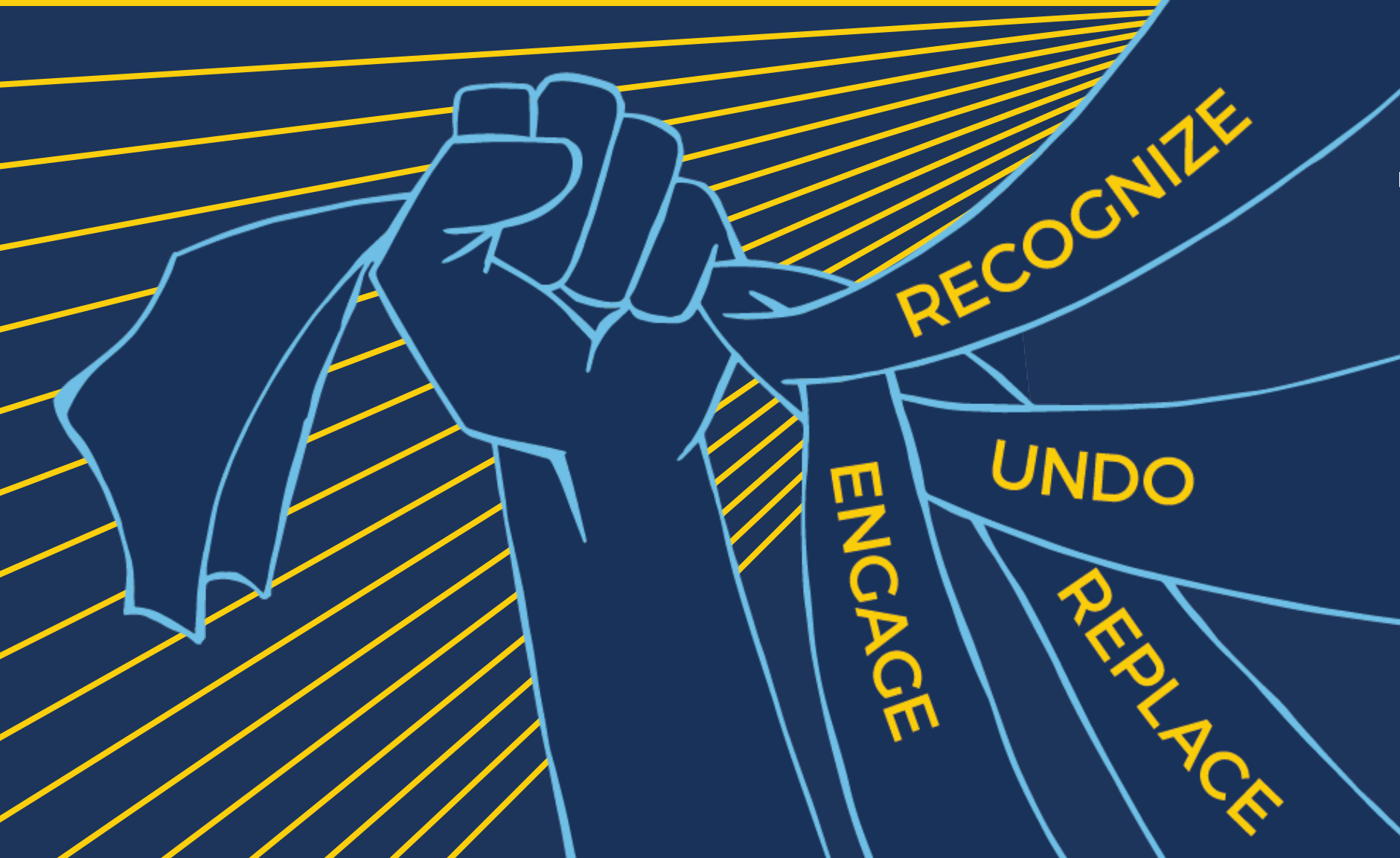
